

Performing chamber music together is an incredible privilege. I want to thank all of you for being part of the NDSU Chamber Music Festival family and for supporting the Festival so enthusiastically. Please join me in thanking those individuals and organizations listed in our program who have so generously supported the Festival in our first ten years. ### **Guest Artists**



Tenor Kelly W. Burns (he/him) is an active performer of opera, concert works, musical theater, and recital throughout North America in vocal repertoire spanning from Claudio Monteverdi to living composers. Among his stage credits are leading and supporting roles in Mozart's Don Giovanni, Così fan tutte, Le nozze di Figaro, Die Zauberflöte, and Die Entführung aus dem Serail, Donizetti's Elisir d'amore, Verdi's Rigoletto, Puccini's Turandot, Wagner's Der fliegende Holländer, Humperdinck's Hansel

and Gretel, Poulenc's Dialogues des Carmelites, Sondheim's Sweeney Todd and A Little Night Music, and Rodger's & Hammerstein's Caronsel. Kelly's concert repertoire includes Handel's Messiah, Bach's B Minor Mass and Magnificat, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Haydn's Creation, Mozart's Requiem and Coronation Mass, and Beethoven's Symphony No. 9. He has performed with organizations such as the Fargo-Moorhead Opera, Chautauqua Opera, Opera Roanoke, Memphis Symphony Chamber Orchestra, Little Orchestra Society of New York, the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra, Charleston Chamber Opera, Opera Project Columbus, LancasterChoral (OH), and the Oxford Shakespear Festival (MS).

Kelly is also passionate about art song and vocal chamber music. In addition to the traditional art songs by European and North American composers, Kelly also performs new works for voice and piano as well as chamber music for tenor, clarinet, and piano as a member of Trio Lirica. He is co-founder of the Unity Series at NDSU which promotes the performance of and education about music composed by traditionally underrepresented artists. He also tours annually throughout the United States for the Piatigorsky Foundation with collaborative pianist Nicholas Shaneyfelt.

As music director and conductor, Kelly's repertoire includes the operas and musicals Le nozze di Figaro, Dido and Aeneas, Die Zauberflöte, The Telephone (Menotti), Lucy (Cipullo), The Pirates of Penzance, Beauty and the Beast, Hairspray, Man of La Mancha, Company, A Year With Frog and Toad, The Sound of Music, The SpongeBob Musical, and Jersey Boys. He has prepared choruses and/or scenes from The Rake's Progress, Die Zauberflöte (German & English), Sweeney Todd, Don Giovanni, The Ballad of Baby Doe, Die Fledermaus, La Traviata, Louise, and Maria Stuarda.

Kelly joined the voice faculty of North Dakota State University's Challey School of Music in 2019. He teaches voice lessons and diction and is Director of NDSU Opera. Kelly holds degrees in music from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and the University of Mississippi.

Colin Carr appears throughout the world as a soloist, chamber musician, recording artist, and teacher. He has played with major orchestras worldwide, including the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, The Philharmonia, Royal Philharmonic, BBC Symphony, the orchestras of Chicago, Los Angeles, Washington, Philadelphia, Montréal and all the major orchestras of Australia and New Zealand. Conductors with whom he has worked include Rattle, Gergiev, Dutoit, Elder, Skrowasczewski and Marriner. He has been a regular guest at the BBC Proms and has twice toured Australia.



With his duo partner Thomas Sauer he has played recitals throughout the United States and Europe including New York, Boston, Philadelphia, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, and the Wigmore Hall in London. Colin has played complete cycles of the Bach Solo Suites at the Wigmore Hall in London, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Gardner Museum in Boston and in Montreal, Toronto, Ottowa and Vancouver. Over the last two seasons he performed 25 cycles of the suites in the USA, Europe, and Asia.

As a member of the Golub-Kaplan-Carr Trio, he recorded and toured extensively for 20 years. Chamber music plays an important role in his musical life. He is a frequent visitor to international chamber music festivals worldwide and has appeared often as a guest with the Guarneri and Emerson string quartets and with New York's Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center.

Recent CD releases include the complete Bach suites on the Wigmore Live label and the complete Beethoven Sonatas and Variations on the MSR Classics label with Thomas Sauer. Colin is the winner of many prestigious international awards, including First Prize in the Naumburg Competition, the Gregor Piatigorsky Memorial Award, Second Prize in the Rostropovich International Cello Competition and also winner of the Young Concert Artists competition.

He first played the cello at the age of five. Three years later he went to the Yehudi Menuhin School, where he studied with Maurice Gendron and later William Pleeth. He was made a professor at the Royal Academy of Music in 1998, having been on the faculty of the New England Conservatory in Boston for 16 years. In 1998, St. John's College, Oxford created the post of "Musician in Residence" for him, and in September 2002 he became a professor at Stony Brook University in New York.

Colin's cello was made by Matteo Gofriller in Venice in 1730. He makes his home with his wife Caroline and 3 children, Clifford, Frankie and Anya, in an old house outside Oxford.



William J. Comita, cellist, performed with the Richmond (VA) Symphony Orchestra for 38 years, including 19 years as Assistant Principal Cellist. Concurrently, in 1995 he was appointed Director of the Strings program at St. Catherine's and St. Christopher's Schools in Richmond, where each year he directed five ensembles in a program of over 100 string students.

While in Virginia, he was cellist in numerous chamber ensembles, most notably the Oberon String Quartet.

Recordings have been on Bruce Hornsby's *Harbor Lights* album

as well as the Opus One, Coastline Music (BMI), Albany Records, and BMG labels. Mr. Comita also appeared as a cellist/movie extra for CBS and HBO productions.

He received his BM at Lawrence University (WI) and his MM at the Cleveland Institute of Music (OH), where he studied with Stephen Geber, former principal cellist of the Cleveland Orchestra. Since 2013, Mr. Comita has been playing in the cello section of the Fargo-Moorhead Symphony Orchestra and in 2021 was appointed Assistant Principal Cello. He currently has a private lesson studio and has performed locally in recitals at Concordia College, North Dakota State University, the University of North Dakota, South Dakota State University, and the Plains Art Museum.

Mr. Comita's cello was made by Saguin in 1842 in Paris, France.

Rolf Haas enjoys a far-reaching and diverse musical life. His primary studies took place with Professor Yair Kless in Graz, Austria and before this, with Professor Sally O'Reilly at the University of Minnesota. In 2021, he completed a Performance Leadership Certificate at Cornell. Mr. Haas plays on his grandfather's Gagliano, and the world premier of the Violin Concerto by Alban Berg was played by his grandfather's teacher Louis Krasner on this instrument.

In 2013, Rolf won the Concerto Competition at his University in Graz, Austria, and was awarded the opportunity to go on a



European Concert tour as soloist playing the same Berg Violin Concerto. He is passionate about the stylistic language of all eras, ranging from Period Performances with the Bach Roots Festival, to working closely with living composers like Kaija Saariaho in the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival. He believes in unity between artistic disciplines and has worked closely with Serbian Sculptor Zoran Mojsilov on many programs and projects. (Continued on next page)

(Rolf Haas biography continued) Rolf will be joining the Phoenix Symphony as First Concertmaster starting in the 24-25 season. He has played in the grammy-award winning St. Paul Chamber Orchestra for the last 10 seasons, and has recently been featured on National Public Radio's "Performance Today". Rolf has also been acknowledged and respected both as a punk rock and a hip-hop artist (emcee/producer). One of his former groups, Nocturnal Unit's final songs and recordings combined compositional techniques of conversational chamber music with a sonic palette of hip-hop, and hardcore punk.



Grace Park is a violinist celebrated for her artistry, passion, and virtuosity. Praised by the San Francisco Chronicle as "fresh, different and exhilarating" and by Strings Magazine for her "intensely wrought and burnished" sound, she captivates audiences worldwide. A winner of the Naumburg International Violin Competition, Ms. Park is recognized both as a dynamic soloist and a devoted chamber musician.

Ms. Park's most recent solo debuts include the Colorado Music Festival, Bard Festival under the baton of Leon Botstein, Stern Auditorium at Carnegie Hall

with the New York Youth Symphony, The Rudolfinum/ Dvorak Hall in Prague with Prague Philharmonia, and recital debuts at Krannert Center, Beethoven Minnesota Festival and Merkin Hall.

Future collaborations include her solo debuts at Seoul Arts Center with Les Musiciens du Louvre with Marc Minkowski, Sarasota Orchestra with Peter Oundjian, Orlando Philharmonic with Eric Jacobsen, along with chamber music debuts at the Savannah Music Festival and Camerata Pacifica. Ms. Park recorded her debut solo album with the Prague Philharmonia and their music director, Emmanuel Villaume, which will include concertos and solo works of Mozart and Dvorak. It is set to be released in the spring of 2025.

A devoted and passionate educator, Ms. Park is an alumnus of Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect and has taught masterclasses and coached at Conservatorio de Musica de Cartagena, Mannes School of Music, University of North Carolina, University of Mississippi, Washington and Lee University, North Dakota State University, Skidmore College, among others. She currently teaches as adjunct professor at the John J. Cali School of Music at Montclair State University.

As a native to Los Angeles, California, Ms. Park began violin at the age of 5 where she trained at the Colburn School of Music. She continued her studies at Colburn Conservatory and New England Conservatory for her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees. Principal teachers are Donald Weilerstein, Miriam Fried, Sylvia Rosenberg, and Robert Lipsett. She now resides in New York City. She performs on a 1717 Giuseppe Filius Andrea Guarneri on loan from an anonymous sponsor.

Matthew Patnode is an active performer in both classical and jazz saxophone idioms. He is Professor of Music at the Challey School of Music at North Dakota State University where he teaches saxophone lessons, saxophone quartet, jazz ensemble, and other jazz courses. He holds a BM degree from the State University of New York at Potsdam, the Prix Vermeil from the Conservatoire National de Bordeaux, France, and MM and DMA degrees from Arizona State University. His saxophone teachers include James Stoltie, Joe Viola, Jean-Marie Londeix, and Joseph Wytko.



Dr. Patnode has performed with the Phoenix Symphony, the Fargo-Moorhead Symphony, and as a featured artist for Minnesota Public Radio's Regional Spotlight. He is often a guest clinician and soloist at college jazz festivals, and past a recipient of the ND Jazz Educator of the year award. Prior to his appointment at NDSU, he taught at Northern State University in South Dakota, at Scottsdale Community College in Arizona, and in residence at the University of Macedonia in Thessaloniki, Greece. He has been featured at regional and national North American Saxophone Alliance conferences, and has performed at international conferences in Canada, Greece, France, Scotland, and Belgium.

A dedicated music educator, he teaches junior high and high school students at the International Music Camp located at the Peace Gardens North Dakota and Manitoba. As a commercial saxophonist, he has performed in groups backing up artists Frankie Valli, Bobby Vinton, Martha Reeves, Wayne Newton, Frankie Avalon, The Temptations, The Four Tops, and on a national tour of The Rat Pack, and the musical Chicago. Current musical projects include the NDSU faculty Boreas Trio (clarinet, saxophone, and piano), whose premier recording was released in 2025 He performs as a member of the FM Kicks Band, the Fargo Saxophone Quartet, the Mardi Gras Kings, and Post Traumatic Funk Syndrome. Matthew Patnode is a Conn-Selmer artist and clinician.



Violist **Jenni Seo** is a compelling and versatile soloist, chamber and orchestral musician known for her rich sound and artistic integrity. She was appointed as Assistant Principal Viola by Gustavo Dudamel in 2023 and was granted tenure recently.

She was a member of the Baltimore Symphony for one season before joining the Minnesota Orchestra as Assistant Principal Viola in 2018. She was also a frequent substitute viola with the New York Philharmonic including

on their international tours. She has made recurring appearances at Music@Menlo festival, Mainly Mozart Festival, Pro Musica Festival, NDSU Chamber Music Festival, Bridge Chamber Music Festival, Bad Leonfelden, Lakes Area Music Festival and Perlman Music Program festivals. She performed extensively across the world in prestigious venues such as Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Kennedy Center, David Geffen Hall, Royal Albert Hall and Walt Disney Hall.

Jenni appeared on stage alongside Itzhak Perlman, Lynn Harrell, Donald Weilerstein, Roger Tapping, David Finckel as well as members of the Cleveland, Takacs, Emerson, and Juilliard String Quartets. She has been presented by the WQXR Midday Masterpieces Series, the Harvard Club of New York, and at the Neue Gallery. The winner of the 2011 ASTA National Solo Competition, Ms. Seo received her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees as the recipient of multiple scholarships from the Juilliard School where she studied with Cynthia Phelps, Heidi Castleman, and Steven Tenenbom and served as Principal Viola of the Juilliard Orchestra.

As an avid educator, she enjoys preparing her students for competitions and auditions. Her students have been accepted to prestigious programs such as Juilliard Pre-college, Mannes Prep program, Manhattan School of Music and many more. She has served as a coach for the viola section in GTCYS Orchestra in Minneapolis and has led classes and sectionals at the University of Minnesota. She served as adjunct viola faculty at the St. Olaf College. The winner of the 2011 ASTA National Solo Competition, Ms. Seo received her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees as the recipient of multiple scholarships from the Juilliard School where she studied with Cynthia Phelps, Heidi Castleman, and Steven Tenenbom and served as Principal Viola of the Juilliard Orchestra.

**Eduard Teregulov** is an award-winning soloist, chamber musician, and recording artist. He started his musical journey at the age of five and now maintains an active career with performances across the United States. His recent performances include playing in Carnegie Hall and DiMenna Center in New York City.

Eduard Teregulov is an avid advocate of the music of living and underrepresented composers. Amplifying and creating platforms for artists of today is central to his music career.



Within the framework of his project on expanding the cello repertoire of the 21st century, Teregulov commissioned and premiered over twenty works for cello, including a cello concerto, works for solo cello, various chamber ensembles, and electro-acoustic compositions. He was invited to perform at festivals, conferences, and concert series including SEAMUS, ChimeFEST at UChicago, Electric LaTex, New Music on the Bayou, Music by Women, Branceleoni International Festival, and many others.

Dr. Teregulov holds the position of Assistant Professor of Cello and Double Bass at Concordia College in Moorhead, MN. He is also a founding member of *Homegrown New Music Ensemble* and the Music Director of the concert series in Fargo, ND - Fugitive Sound Experience.



Pianist **Tyler Wottrich** is Director and Associate Professor at the NDSU Challey School of Music, where he created a graduate collaborative piano program and serves as artistic director of the NDSU Chamber Music Festival.

Wottrich is the recipient of the Emerson String Quartet's Ackerman Prize for chamber music and has served on the collaborative piano faculty of the Banff Centre. An alumnus of Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect, Wottrich has worked with such composers as John Luther Adams, John Corigliano, Georg Friedrich Haas, Jocelyn Hagen, Richard Hundley, David Lang, Libby Larsen, Missy Mazzoli, Dominick Argento, and Bright Sheng. The video of a cartoon theme mash-up Wottrich composed for Ensemble Connect has surpassed 2 million views on YouTube. Wottrich accompanied mezzo-soprano Clara Osowski in winning 2nd Prize at the 2017 Das Lied International Song Competition as well as 4th Prize, the Richard Tauber Prize for the best interpretation of Schubert Lieder, and the Ralph Vaughan Williams Society Prize for the best interpretation of a British song at the 2017 and 2019 Wigmore Hall International Song Competitions.

## **Student Artists**



Thiago André, a Brazilian pianist, began his studies at the Lorenzo Fernândez Conservatory and earned his bachelor's from Minas Gerais Federal University under Celina Szrvinsk. He holds a master's from the University of North Dakota and is pursuing a DMA at North Dakota State University, where he received the 2024 Graduate College Teaching Award and the Challey Doctoral Fellowship.

Thiago has performed across Brazil and the U.S., presented at CMS and ICA conferences, and served as Competition

Coordinator for the 2024 PianoArts North American Competition in Milwaukee, WI. He also works as a collaborative pianist and organist at Sts. Anne and Joachim Catholic Church in Fargo.

Pianist **Yin-Chu Chen** was born in Taiwan and finished her master's degree at Taipei National University of the Arts in 2022. She won 1st prize at the 2022 Japan Classical Music Awards, 1st prize at the 2020 International Taiwan Boesendorfer Piano Competition, 6th prize at the 2019 International Singapore Piano Vompetition, 1st prize at the 2018 Hong Kong Chopin Piano Competition, 1st prize at the 2015 Tokyo International Piano Competition, and 1st prize at the Taipei National University of the Arts Emerging Young Artists Concerto competition, among numerous other competition prizes.
